

Traditional neighborhoods back in vogue

Hunts Crossing Development being built in Colonial Heights area

KINGSPORT — George Hunt looked over the rolling hills and off into the dis-

"This land has been in my family for more than 100 years. We wanted to do something special here," he said.

That "something special" is Hunts Crossing Development, a new "old-style neighborhood" being constructed off Moreland Drive in Colonial Heights.

The development is designed to blend houses, small businesses and community gathering points into one neighborhood, linked by sidewalks and walking trails.

"One purpose is to foster a sense of community. Neighbors will know neighbors," said Hunt, who is the founder and manager of the development.

Hunts Crossing is a "traditional neighborhood development" — a concept that began in the 1990s and has spread to various parts of the country. Hunt said his project is the first traditional neighborhood development — or TND — in East Tennessee. He said he got the idea when he visited several TNDs in Charlotte,

"We started visiting the projects as they were evolving. Since then, we have visited most of the TND projects at least within 500 miles of here or more," Hunt

A TND is a comprehensive planning system that includes a variety of housing

types and land uses in a defined area. It could include everything from educational facilities and civic buildings to commercial offices and shops located within walking distance of private homes. These developments are served by a network of paths, streets and lanes, giving residents the option of walking, biking or driving to places within their

Hunt said his son lives outside Lynchburg, Va., where a TND called Wyndhurst is located. He said the developers at Wyndhurst have constructed 80 percent of the 100-acre project within five years, making it the fastest-growing TND in Virginia.

"There is a real attraction to these projects," Hunt said.

"Our experience draws from the times when neighborhoods really meant neighbors, when porches were used for sitting, and a stroll down a sidewalk would lead to a neighborhood shop," reads the Crossing (www.huntscrossing.com). "At Hunts Crossing, we are creating a sense of com-

munity where people can sit on their front porch, talk with neighbors and walk to neighborhood stores. You can go home Hunts Crossing spans 80 acres and will

include 170 houses, a town center, and


neighborhood businesses. Phase I, called The Cedars, will include 22 homes along
